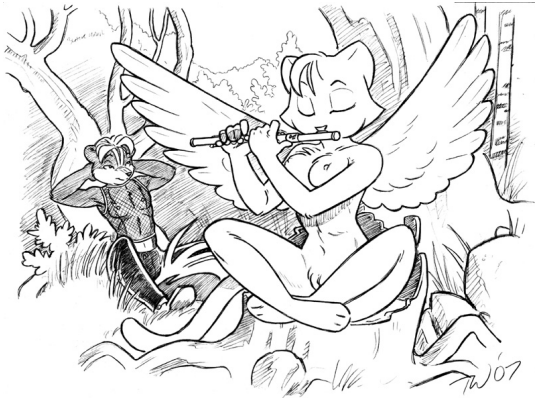

Why the Great Wars of Europe Had to Be

Some months ago, *Broken Pencil* used to trade with *BCSFazine*. At least they started sending us copies, so obligingly I started sending them copies, and then they stopped. Just before wrapping up this issue I picked up a newsstand copy of *Broken Pencil*, and lo and behold, they had a short review of *BCSFazine*.

They weren't impressed.

I can understand why. J. Blackmore's review in *Broken Pencil* #38 finds this just an average, kind of high-schoolish newsletter, with mostly internal references and little to interest an outsider, particularly someone deeply into the independent-publishing scene. He is saying that he doesn't get why we are asking money for this, and implying that we don't get the current zine scene. Both claims are right.

Of course a few claims rankle me. The fact that our content is now limited is a matter of economics. The fact that I don't do exciting and imaginative things with layout has more to do with my lack of time than lack of imagination; I wanted to go back to the graphic ads we used to use in *BCSFazine* (and couldn't find them). The reason any article tamely follows its heading without interruption, and I don't chop up articles with "continued on/from p. (x)", has to do with at least one *BCSFazine* reader being easily confused by this ordinary magazine practice. I had to bow to necessity. But this is all making excuses.

Jennifer Ennis, who is handling a retrospective book for the 25th anniversary Keycon, asked me in November for an article on Winnipeg fandom before Keycon. Once or twice I used the term "fannish fandom" and I simply could not give her an explanation that satisfied her. And this is something I thought any fan should know. Jennifer imagined anything fans are doing – anime, gaming, filking, costuming, etc. – was fannish.

She didn't get what I was on about, and I don't get what sort of fandom she inhabits. And neither of us is in the wrong, it's just ... parts of fandom have gone that far apart; there's no common basis of experience anymore, if there ever was.

One of my dirty little secrets is that I really didn't get classic fanzine fandom, after all; I only realized how out of step I was when I actually attended a Potlatch in Seattle. In all honesty I will admit that I don't get current indie zinedom, either. And now I confess, **I don't get what BCSFA is for.**

I *have* asked you, you know. I have asked people in these pages, and in person when I thought of it, what they wanted in

these pages, or for that matter what they wanted BCSFA to be. But asking in print somehow doesn't work – maybe you're shy? – and asking people to think about their assumptions doesn't work, either. Took me long enough to understand that.

So, is there anything *you* don't get? Like, why all the foregoing is even an issue?

Well, the reason we were charging for this newsletter was to keep it afloat. We can obviate that, somewhat, by going almost entirely online; except some members can't get *BCSFazine* online. The reason for BCSFA's existence is less clear. Graeme and Kathleen and I have been trying to come to grips with this, and I think the plain fact is that the needs that were served by a general-interest club – or convention – are now being met by special-interest groups, more in tune with contemporary SF fans: fans of anime, or gaming, or fantasy costuming, or medieval recreation, or filking, or ... you get the idea. Maybe with one or two interests, but not an interest in all fandom. Let alone all SF and fantasy.

You see what I'm getting at. For a while now we have needed a reason for BCSFA, some attraction or function that our club offers and others may not; and we have refused to supply one, or even define one.

We can't afford to avoid the issue anymore.
