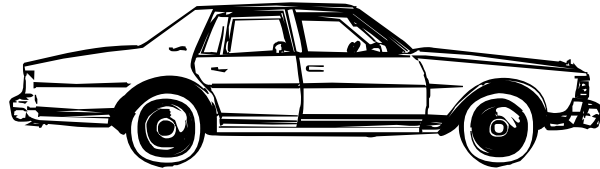

the dratted thing. Since I started pubbing
my genzine *Peregrine Nations* five years
ago, I've learned that not thinking a lot is

much better when editing and designing the layout.

[I would be interested in reading Peregrine Nations. Is it “the usual”?]

It frees the creative areas of my brain to do their work and makes my internal editor shut up. I’ve had my own battles with *MS Word* and flying graphics; *OpenOffice* is a lot better about graphic insertion, I’ve found. And it’s free.

[I tried OpenOffice, but still prefer Word.]

As far as wrapping text around graphics goes, I’d suggest using a test page or two to just play around with, before attempting this again in your fanzine. Making sure to add or subtract

lines/spaces when moving graphics around is key in getting things to stay put; consider inserting the graphics first and then the text. I should take my own advice. <g> Without the stress of using the actual fanzine pages/file, you might find it easier to achieve the effects you want.

[I might leave an entire 4.25×5.5-inch half-page blank to hand-paste each illustration in, the way I do my mini-comics, This Is What Happens When You Don’t Eat Your Vegetables and Drawings of the Vancouver Goth Scene.]

it's expensive.*]

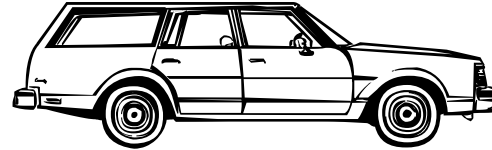
“Why Ray Hates the CBC (Part

Jacqueline: Terry-cloth.

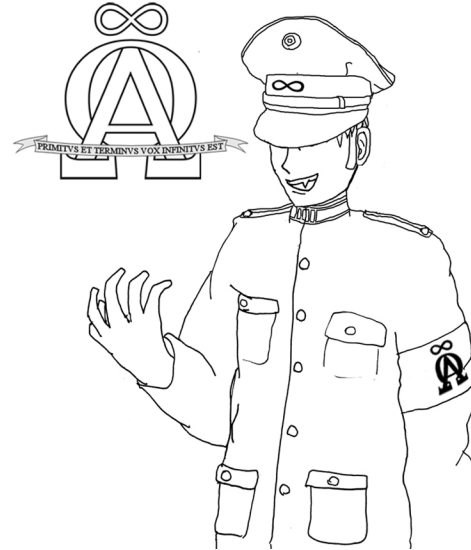

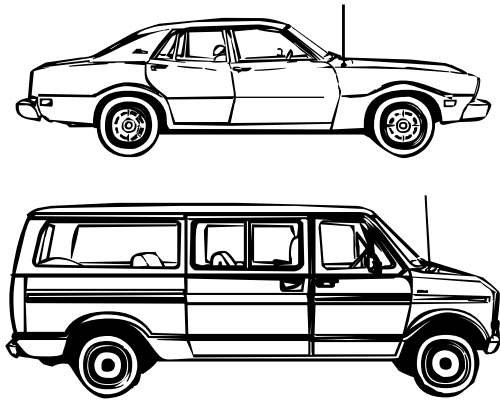
Such heretics earned their violent deaths, crushed under the wheels of the

The book I saw listed was *The Kangaroo in Canadian Service* (<http://www.imperialhobbies.ca/products/detail.php?prodID=40801>).

“Although armoured half-tracks were used in some numbers for troop transport in WW2, there were only a relatively small number of fully tracked armoured personnel carriers in use. These were generally called Kangaroos. The best known of these were the Canadian Ram tanks used in NW Europe.”

Documentary About Revolutionary Comics (with Animation Mixed In) Unauthorized and Proud of It: Todd Loren's Rock 'n' Roll Comics. Directed by Ilko Davidov; A BulletProof Film Production; TRT 80 mins.

“[The film is about] Todd Loren, the controversial publisher of unauthorized comic book biographies of rock stars. The new documentary mixes animation and eerie home video with numerous interviews. [...] [Loren] founded his comic book company in 1989. [...] An enigmatic figure, he was a brilliant businessman and a First Amendment crusader, but he was also known for creating legions of enemies through his insufferable behavior. [...]

“Rock ’n’ Roll Comics was largely derided by others in the comic book industry and hated by the music business [...] yet it was Loren who fought the good fight and won a landmark court case that established First Amendment protections for comics and graphic novels.

“At the height of his success, however, Loren was fatally stabbed. His murder remains unsolved 13 years later, though clues point to Andrew Cunanan, the reported serial killer who has been linked to the 1997 slaying of fashion designer Gianni Versace. [...]

“The film stands as a celebration of youthful exuberance and imagination.”

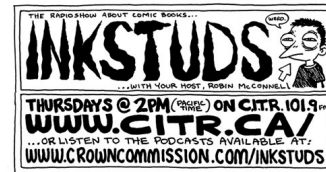
and then have an active and open discussion about it, with the cartoonists themselves acting as the panel of experts.”

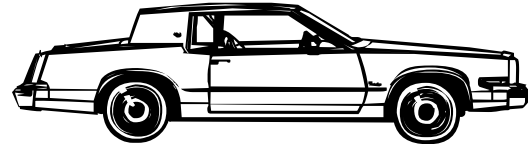
I’m not sure if I’ve ever written *anything* close to 10,000 words (I’ve forgotten what my longest school essay was).

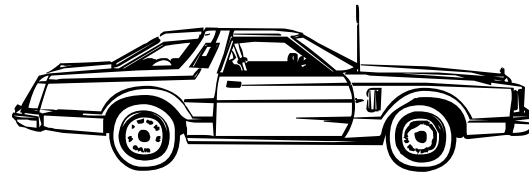


**‘Batman: The Animated Series’:

I like the episode of *Batman: The Animated Series* “I’ve Got Batman in My Basement.” It’s one of the many episodes of the series with flat, choppy, non-Japanese animation, but it has enough quality in other ways to make it surprisingly likeable: good voice acting and music; good characters; nice atmosphere (Batman lying on a sofa in a boy named Sherman’s basement “crime lab”; colouring and shadows that convey afternoon; the Batmobile hidden under a pile of empty cardboard boxes). This
