"modern Worldcon" on its way
out?

I know this: Any foreign travel (with the possible exception of Canada, which is a few miles due south of us*) is a questionable venture, with Megan's health, reduced ability to breathe, especially on airplanes, mobility problems, and our financial situation. Even small conventions more than a six or seven hour drive for us -- think Chicago, Milwaukee, Cleveland, Columbus, or Toronto as limiting factors -- would seem to be out of the question.

And, lest we forget, President Shrub is bound and determined to force us into war, maybe on two fronts at once. This would make travel outside our borders a highly chancy thing. I'm even told that the *Geheimestaatspolizei* -- sorry, the Department of Homeland Security -- wants to set up checkpoints at state borders, making the continental United States a series of forty-eight separate

WHAT'S THE FREQUENCY, KENNETH?

This number of *Lightning Round* is coming out about where and when I had hoped when I started the project. If I can keep up the pace, and get it all together, maybe I can keep up to every three to five weeks.

This would be a way to soak up a lot of my writing that would otherwise lay around, clogging up my creative outlets.

And there's nothing to stop this activity from being creative, also.

OTHER THINGS THAT HAPPEN...

I may have mentioned it here and there, or now and then, but I'm getting back into things I was enthused about in college, what seems like many eons ago. Things such as the creation of motion pictures.

(The other things I was interested in at that time aren't things I think I should be picking back up - namely, the intemperate swilling of bheer and the lusting after 18-to-22 year old females. Lusting after them didn't do me much good back then, anyway.)

I am concentrating, since it is the least expensive in the way of monetary outlay, on screenwriting. For those of you who write, it is really a different discipline than writing narrative fiction. The restrictions of the form force you to be more creative in your writing.

As an example, you cannot show someone's interior monologue. Using a voice-over (someone talking and explaining things in the scene) is either a *film noir* detective cliché or the hallmark of a hack writer. There is probably another way - a *visual* way - to have the character put across what's going on.

Example: The main character has just broken up with her boyfriend. She looks at a framed picture of him in her room. If she were to take the picture, look at it for a moment, then fling it with all her might into the wall, that would say a few things about her emotional state, wouldn't you say?

There are almost always alternatives to voice-overs, or to writing "on-the-nose" dialogue (dialogue that says exactly what it means, without leaving the audience - or the actors, for that matter - any room to appreciate the propensities of human beings to say nothing of what they really mean during a conversation.) The seemingly unconcerned accomplice, who keeps quickly looking out the window, and who jumps out of her skin when the phone rings. The hesitations, the omissions, the attempts to misdirect questioners... these are what bring subtlety to the writing.
