BLACK CAT #0, from Alan and DeeDee White (and the cat), available at efanzines.com. Either an annual or a one-shot. // A very nice, four-page New to friends and fellow fans from the Whites of Las Vegas. Great story about the lists of books read, movies viewed and magazines received, as well as news project and his own fanhistory. Alan's art is up to its usual stellar quality.

Any faned who hasn't taken advantage of Alan's work is either a nitwit or hasn't got Alan's mailing address; for the latter, ask me.

CHUNGA 2 "Lawyers, Guns and Chunga" from Andy Hooper, Randy Byers and Carl Juarez. Inquire for paper copies at Chunga, 1013 N. 36th, Seattle, WA 98103. Also available for download online at efanzines.com . Irregular. Available for trade, editorial whim, or "grudgingly" for \$3.50 per ish. // I have to thank "Mr. Mephisto and the Autumn of the Monster Culture" by Andy Hooper for a memory kick; my junior-high-school weekends were often spent with my best-friend-of-the-moment Martha, watching the local TV stations' monster-movie offerings. Hooper includes his own Halloween memories and a onceover of the pervasive path that "Monster Culture" carved into the consciousness of a generation. "Atom Smasher" is fanzine reviews by Robert Lichtman, this time examining *Uncle Smiley's Bookcase* (Ray Nelson) and *eFNAC* (John Foyster). A graphic novel about J. Robert Oppenheimer "and the Political Science of the Atomic Bomb" is the subject of "Fallout" by Luke McGuff. Alison Freebairn wanders amusingly through the fields of her own fantasies in "Alison Through the Looking Glass." "Metropolis Regained" by Gregory Rihn, "Zefram Cochrane and the Crisis in Federation Continuity" by Andy Hooper and "Starship Troopers vs. the Monsters from the Id" by Randy Byers round out thish. These guys are still obviously very attached to the idea of *Apparatchik* because they keep referring to it a lot. To each his own. Art interiors cam from Luke McGuff, Craig Smith, Ian Gunn, Bill Rotsler, Alexis Gilliland, Stu Shiffman, Dan Steffan, Bill Kunkel and Brad Foster. Another snazzy ish, but not jam-packed with riveting prose. Keep at it, guys.

CONVERS[at]IONS 1, Issue 1, Nov. 2002, from Douglas Spencer. Available at efanzines.com for The Usual. Irregular. // Fascinating and brief look inside the editor's life. In "Life Without Anne," he remembers the death of his partner-in-life, and in a pair of articles -- "Faith and Religion" and "Belief and Proof" -- discusses his spiritual beliefs with Max, among other articles. The layout produces an 8-page zine printed on a single page, both sides -- one commits folding to achieve the greeting-card effect. Sincerity will get one everywhere, and this one got me. I'm looking forward to reading more from Mr. Spencer, when he decides to pub again.

CRAZY FROM THE HEAT #1 from the Trufan Ten and Las Vegrants, available at efanzines.com or for the Usual (in paper form) from Joyce Katz, 330 S. Decatur Blvd., PMB 152, Las Vegas, NV 89107. "Frequent but as yet undetermined schedule" for pubbing, dontcha know. // Well, I got my wish twice --

Arnie Katz hasn't disappeared from fanzining entirely, he's been plotting **two** of them. Zine by committee certainly takes the pressure off one person by making several people write at least one something for the ish. Whether this can continue remains to be seen, but this one's off to a good start. It's mostly concerned with various contributors' recollections of how this fanzine came to be. Aileen Forman's column is on her difficulty in learning Spanish. Everything here is quite readable, and worth reading. But I think the Ten can reduce the rich brown jokes without damaging the atmosphere of this zine. May we be crazed from the heat more than twice a year?

GNAT'S TESTICLES, Autumn 2002, a one-shot from Max and Ang, Autumn 2002, available at efanzines.com or from Max at 20 Bakers Lane Peterborough, Cambs, PE2 9QW UNITED KINGDOM. // Delightfully silly four-pager offering "The Bluffer's Guide to Fandom" by Ang Rosin and some equally silly of photos of dolls doing potentially illegal things. Phannish phun abounds.

GREEN STUFF #17, for FAPA mailing No. 261 from Murray Moore, 1065 Henley Road, Mississauga, Ontario L4Y 1C8 CANADA. // Murray's apparently sent GS out in place of *Aztec Blue* since he's very busy doing convention-type stuff. This is certainly a worthy substitute, with reports on ConJose, Con-Version 19/Canvention 22/ConSpec 2002 and World Fantasy Con 2001. I gotta get into this FAPA thing soon, I'm missing a lot!

GUY AND ROSIE FOR DUFF, a DUFF race platformzine from Guy and Rose-Marie Lillian, available at efanzines.com . // Now that they've won the race, will Rose-Marie be able to cajole Guy into actually getting the trip report done inside of 12 months' time? Will Guy actually have time to write about the trip? Will someone send \$\$ so Guy and pub the latest ish of *Challenger*? Stay tuned! Clever roo art by the amazing Alan White graces this publication in the form of a logo. Nice job, folks!

NEITHER RAIN, NOIR MURDER...#111/26/02, a DAPA-Em zine from Bill Bowers, available at efanzines.com or from BB at 4651 Glenway Ave., Cincinnati, OH 45238-4503. Probably irregular. // Nifty mystery mag with a great article by Jim Doherty on researching police-procedural novels. Anyone with an interest in the mystery genre would likely enjoy this.

NO TIME, NO ENERGY & NOT MUCH TO SAY 1, 2, 3, from dwain Kaiser, 645 E. Base Line Rd., Claremont, CA 91711 or at efanzines.com . Available for The Usual. // dwain debuts an e-zine (for LASFapa at least once and, one guesses, trade purposes for zines which appear more often than *Non-stop Fun*). #1 introduces the zine and includes an e-discussion on West Nile virus, photos, and some 1969 artwork by Jim Schumacher. #2 chronicles dwain's health situation over the last year, Neal Clark Reynolds sends a riposte to the West Nile chat from #1, and John Welsh provides more weird and wonderful tales in his continuing ValSFA Chronicles column. More photos from The Good Ol' Daze also appear. #3 includes dwain on Bruce Pelz, lacking time, California fires, and strange arrests; Larry Parr on flying with a beard and airport security checks, and musings on moose (*Plokta* alert!); and Lyn Pederson on the Las Vegas fireworks displays on New Year's Eve. Lloyd Penney gets a LoC in, too. For those for whom NFIHOTH isn't frequent enough, this is a good way to spend time until the nextish of dwain's fine genzine appears. But I'd consider a title change, dwain: from this zine's frequency, it seems like you have enough of all three -- for now, at least.

QUOKKA QUEST #1, the DUFF campaignzine of Mike and Linda McInerney, available at efanzines.com or from the Macs at 83 Shakespeare St., Daly City, CA 94014-1053. Probably a one-shot. // Nicely done zine which features very readable articles from Dick Lupoff, rich brown and John Straede as well as Mike himself (the filksongs, if I'm permitted to call them that, are interesting as well). In fan races, only one candidate gets the trip, and

sadly the Macs will have to sit this dance out. I feel sure they'd wish the Lillians a safe trip downunder and back, and perhaps we'll see their names in another fannish race.

SCOPUS: 3007, #12 from Alexander Bouchard, via efanzines.com links or to PO Box 573, Hazel Park, MI 48030-0573. Irregular. Available for The Usual. // Nice to see a more recent ish of this one. AB covers MilPhil, Harry Potter and censorship, the first HP movie, food and lost LoCs. Megan Bouchard writes an account of AB's arrest that is harrowing to read. The Post Awful really IS, in some places. Yikes. The Bouchards' entanglement with USPS and the legal system reeks of trumped-up charges and shameful lawenforcement actions. I wish the Bouchards luck in obtaining a fair turn in court, but my cynical side doesn't expect the best. The MilPhil pics are quite good and the conrep is in the tradition (if a bit longish) of Worldconreps I Have Read -- newsy and creatively written. Certainly a zine worth reading more than once.

THEY MADE ME DO IT, Summer 2002, a perzine by Max, 20 Bakers Lane Peterborough, Cambs, PE2 9QW UNITED KINGDOM. No announced schedule, might even be a one-shot. Available at efanzines.com or from the writer. // A very clean, unfussy, text-based layout showcases some of Max's perszine-styled writings. This publication is "blamed" on Mark Plummer, Claire Brialey and Tony Keen. Good thing they twisted Max's arm. Writings include "Hedgehog," "<Plokta.con 2.0>, the Comfort Zone, and Me" and "Z 104." Well worth reading.

THEY MADE US DO IT, Autumn 2002, a genzine by Max, 20 Bakers Lane Peterborough, Cambs, PE2 9QW UNITED KINGDOM. No announced schedule Available at efanzines.com or from the writer. // Max allows as how TMMDI morphed into TMUDI when she decided to publish Simon Bradshaw's "Watching Falling Stars" (viewing a meteor shower), "Gathering Rain" by Ang Rosin (on the glory of rainstorms), her own "July 4th, Kenwood Beach" and Douglas Spencer's "Life Without Anne." Of her selections, Max writes: "Some work really is crying out to be committed to paper, no matter how happy it is sitting there on the internet." Hints of continuing in a like vein are scattered about; those interested in same should make their interest known soon.

THE WSFA JOURNAL, November 2002, official newsletter of the Washington Science Fiction Association, from efanzines.com . // Standard clubzine fare is here, competently written and easy to read when printed out, with illos and a bit of color. It has a strong sense of *averageness* that's hard to escape. Of course, my clubzine reading experience is limited, so my perspective may be skewed. Worth a look.
