Books completed in January

Reader's Digest Condensed Books: A Bend In The Road by Nicholas Sparks; very good Romance tale with some twists; The Woman Next Door by Barbara Delinsky; good romance dealing with an obsession with getting pregnant; being pregnant without a husband and teenage suicide. Jackdaws by Ken Follett; WWII tale about fighting behind the lines in France, with some love interests. KInd of silly in places; not bad. Long Time NO See by Susan Isaacs. Quirky murder mystery with middle aged female history prof as detective and unrepentent adulteress.

RDCB: False IMpression by Jeffery Archer; quite good thriller, too much art and high finance to make it great; At First Sight by Nicholas Sparks; sequel to A Bend In The Road; read this way purely by accident; Sun At Midnight by Rosie RThomas; a foolish English scientist goes to Antarctica; has a baby there; worst book of the 8 in these 2 volumes. Cover Your Assets by Patricia Smiley; good mystery of the new style, with wit and humor and sassy female lead characters.

The Crossbow Murder by Carter Dickson; a murder mystery solved via trial, published way back in 1938,set in England about 1900. So.so.

GOLDEN YEARS by Andrew M. Greeley. "If you call it asking, maybe 18 or 20." KInd of blows the myth that Wolfe never leaves the house. Fourth of July Picnic has an autobiography; it would make Also has Easter Parade, one of the silliest of the Wolfe novels.

THE CARDINAL SINS by Andrew M. GReeley; a novel of 4 not too nice people; a demanding and ridiculous church; dishonest and morally bankrupt church people; crime; lots of stuff. Second time around for this one.

One I would love to read: RED THREADS by REx Stout. Inspector Cramer solves a murder without Wolfe!!!

THE MAGDALENE CIPHER by Jim Hougan. A modern day Maxwell Smart, complete with an unwilling Agent 99, takes on the CIA which is a cover for The Magdalene Society. The ending was cool; most of the book was amusing.

DEMON SEED by Dean Koontz. Strange but rather compelling novel.; second time. for it.

RIFIFI IN NEW YORK by Auguste LeBreton.Old style cops, robbers and goofs novel, okay.

HELLFIRE by Jake LOgan; Slocum adult western.

THE ORPHAN by Stella Cameron; historical romance set in London, U.K.,c/w a ghost who argues with Shakespeare; a Scottish lass and an overbearing, bossy male.

Farming daze by Elizabeth Underwood; the first in a series of hilarious adventures by my friend Lyn McConchie on things which happen on her small farm.

EDDIE MACON'S RUN by James McLendon. Intriguing novel about a poor guy trying to get a better life who is railroaded into prison in Texas; escapes and tries to run to Mexico to join his wife and kids; meets various obstacles but wins in the end. An important part: after being beaten and almost killed by some redneck ranchers and escaping, Eddie goes into serious depression but then realizes that he should concentrate on the now. Keep the long range in plan but deal with what is in front of you in the immediate present and take what comes. Good idea.

As it happened, I had just gotten some work; and rather than conserve money I was going out and buying things I could do without; tubs of chocolates; even some potato chips. Then I kicked my ass for spending that money, with tons of bills coming and no idea for sure how much money I could make or when it would come. I found it intriguing that shortly after that bit of personal grouchiness, I read the section in which Eddie determined to live in the now. Eddie made it, by the way. Real life rarely lets people win.

I meant to say, keep the long range plan in mind. Will it work in real life? Well, after 6 years in prison, Eddie found himself alone and naked with a former Playmate and couldn't get it up. I guess if one can believe that part of the story might be true ...reason being that he was a one woman man ...it might be true that plans actually come to fruition occasionally.

THE BEST MAN IN TEXAS by Kristine Rolofson; one of those Harlequin things; fairly amusing. Not too many sex scenes to skip.

BRIMSTONE BASIN by Owen Rountree; a Cord novel; Western of sorts.

MURDER OF A SWEET OLD LADY by DEnise Swanson; a highly amusing novel featuring a rather strange female: a school psychologist who is young and overweight who dislikes being helped by her parents and who stumbles around through a crime and various school cases getting into trouble. Lots of school politics; lots of psychological stuff; tons of family material, anyone who thinks their family might be dysfunctional should read this book. Of course, she gets all this resolved. Well, mostly. This is #2 in a series; she breaks up with one guy; anguishes over another and some things are left open for the next book. The murdered old lady is this gal's grandmother. Ms. Swanson dedicates the book to her grandparents, all dead. Also to her cat: Purrcie the cat, 1979-1999. LOng live for one of those beasts
