SNAPS Is Off to Great Start!

A Ross Chamberlain cover depicting a fannish publishing session graced the front cover of the first distribution of the Southern Nevada Amateur Press Associate (SNAPS). Official Editor Joyce Katz, assisted by several helpful fans, collated the new group's first distribution at the 4/8 Westside SNAFFU meeting.

Responding to Joyce's combination of cheerleading, nagging and not-so-veiled threats, 10 contributors combined to produce a 26-page disty, an excellent showing for the kick-off.

Two Las Vegas fans, Lori Forbes and Teresa Cochran, capitalized on the opportunity to produce their very first fanzines. The mailing also saw the return to publishing for Linda Bushyager, James Taylor and Ross. Other contributors to SNAPS inaugural disty were: Joyce Katz, Woody Bernardi, JoHn Hardinm Kathryn Daughterty and (inevitably) me. James had the districion of submitting the first SNAPS contribution. Linda and Ross tied for the largest SNAPSzines, at four pages each.

Fannish Religions — Arnie Katz

The newest generation of Las Vegas fans often talks about religion, so here's a piece that may open new vistas for those seeking that ideal denomination.

Fans, especially the pioneering ones in the 1930's, generally respected science and logic, giving more weight to factual proof than cherished belief. That is only to be expected of those who are willing to defy the world by reading "that crazy Buck Rogers stuff."

So although many fans claimed a religious affiliation (often Jewish or Catholic), few fans went in for a lot of actual religion.

A few, such as the flaming idealists who clustered around Donald A. Wolheim in the mid-to-late 1930's and early 1940's, subscribed to the belief that organized religion is the opiate of the people and took a more antagonistic attitude. They concocted a burlesque of religion that they dubbed "GhuGhuism." It's tenets are a little murky, because only a few chapters of its Gholy Ghible were ever actually published, but Don Wolheim was its ghod. (And that's where all those extra "H"es come from.)

Jack Speer, and others who held a less harsh view of religion, retaliated with FooFooism, which was more of a send-up of GhuGhu-ism than a parody of religion itself.

GooFooists claimed that Wolheim wasn't really ghod; their deity was a beetle-like monster inhabiting the subside of the planet Vulcan.

The sacred foo cat smiled upon worshippers, unlike the scary GhuGhu. FooFoo was closely associated with the use of the hectograph and the spirit duplicator (as opposed to the mimeograph, which was guarded over by GhuGhu in all his awesomeness.)

Lee Hoffman reinvented the whole idea of fannish religions circa 1950s. Instead of Wolheim's perpetual anger, she brought a wonderful sense of humor and a Trufannish love for fellow fans to the topic. She championed Ghu as the god of Fandom, but this turned out to be a much more benevolent deity than DAW's version.

For a time, Ghu and FooFoo proselytized fans without much competition. Then Art Rapp brought forth Roscoe. The plucky Beaver quickly found favor with fans and became the third major religion. (There are some minor ones, such as Pthallo, invented by Karen Anderson. Pthallo's sacred color is blue, so Karen always printed her fanzines, mostly for SAPS and FAPA, with that color ink.)

Roscoe has made great strides in recent years, thanks largely to the zeal of Andy Hooper. Of course, it's all in good fun and the "controversy" is not really seirous.

And then there was the time that John Trimble, frustrated by the inability of the Navy guy who was guiding him through his application form to understand the concept of Agnosticism, spontaneously invented the Great God Agnos... —Arnie

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SNAFFU (4/8) Meeting Report — Arnie Katz

The first distribution of SNAPS, the new local apa, added some excitement to the 4/8 SNAFFU meeting, held at Borders Bookstore on Sahara. Joyce and I arrived early so she could collect the contributions, so we knew that both enthusiasm for the group and the page count of its first distribution had exceeded expectations. Joyce postponed handing out copies until near the end of the meeting or we might all have wound up with our noses buried in the 26-page SNAPS #1.

President Michael Benstein banged the metaphorical gavel a few minutes after the scheduled 8 PM start time. The wisdom of patience became obvious when a wave of slightly tardy (but still lovable) fans filled in all of the available chairs by about 10 minutes past the hour.

Joyce Kohler, who debuted at the David Brin event, was an early arrival, too. That gave her a chance to meet Joyce Katz, with whom she shares not only a given name, but a middle name and surname initial. Joyce magnanimously permitted the newcomer to retain her current name.

My enthusiasm got the better of me when Michael plugged the Daugherty Pool Party on Saturday. I burred that there are *three* major events set for the weekend of April 16-17. I rhapsodized about the Big Weekend, one of the most exciting in Las Vegas fanhistory and exhorted fans to come out for one or all of them — and to check *VFW* for all the details.

Talk of all that fanac revved up Woody Bernardi who offered intriguing details about the First Annual Las Vegas Fantasy & Science Fiction Day, which will be held at the Clark County Library on April 30, 10:30 AM to 6:00 PM. Woody outlined some of the program and listed major speakers.

Talk of what SNAFFU should do as a club to support Fantasy & SF Day prompted Linda Bushyager to raise what she considers a prime SNAFFU problem, failure to properly promote the club. Michael countered her criticism of the SNAFFU website for alleged lack of timeliness and scarcity of content, with assertions that he and Roxanne post updates regularly and that they would put up more content if people submitted it.

I agreed that promotion is *an* area that could use more ideas and effort, but added that there are other problems, too. I acknowledged the many recent updates, but also said that vague, mass calls for content don't work; that editors have to make specific requests of individuals to get action. After pointing out the tremendous amount of work Michael and Roxy do for the club, I suggested that he might consider looking to others for assistance.

Several members, including me, looked searchingly at SNAFFU's vice president Kent Hastings, who appears to have a computer growing out of one of his hand. It seems likely that either he or Linda will help Michael maintain the site.

Some asked for something that already exists: reports of the meetings. *Vegas Fandom Weekly* seldom lets a SNAFFU meeting pass without a full report. While this newszine belongs to all of Vegas Fandom, not any one club, it publicizes and reports SNAFFU more fully than any incarnation of *SitNorm*, the club's suspended newsletters. (I also have no objection to the SNAFFU site posting meeting reports from *VFW* once the next *VFW* is posted there.)

Several members suggested that the club appoint a secretary to report on meetings for the site. Unfortunately, very few fans go to both the Westside and Eastside meetings — and none of them wants to be secretary. If the SNAFFU site reprinted the reports from *VFW*, members would have them no more than 10 days after the meeting, pretty timely compared to the old *SitNorm*. Why add to the bureaucracy?

The night's major topic was "The Future of the Police State," which got off to a bad start and never did become a discussion about police states in science fiction. Almost everyone agreed that the future looks very bright for police states, so I guess parents of kids who show signs of ability as thugs, snitches, weasels and sadists ought to point them in that career path.

After the meeting, many of the attendees accompanied Ron & Linda Bushyager to the Palms for the best kind of dinner — free. Other at the meeting were: Darmon Thornton, Shane Roth, Rachel Mainz, John Hardin and Woody Bernardi. — Arnie

Las Vegas Futurists (4/8) Meeting Report — David Gordon

Twenty-three (23) members of the **Las Vegas Futurists** gathered at *Palace Station Hotel* for a buffet dinner on Friday evening, 8 April. After dinner, we moved to a conference room where *John Smart*, founder of the **Acceleration Studies Foundation (ASF)** (<http://www.accelerating.org/>), inculcated us with his vision of the future, **Creating the Symbiotic Age: Activism**. *Iveta Brigis* ably aided and abetted John's presentation.

The ASF explains its purpose thusly (from its website): The ASF Tagline is "Awareness | Analysis | Forecasting | Action." We explore the rapid present and faster future of our increasingly technological and computational world via four key processes: improving public awareness, data-driven analysis, technological and social forecasting, and concrete plans of action with regard to accelerating processes of change.

John's presentation exceeded 2 ½ hours, as we explored a gamut of relevant topics, including education, globalism, *NGOs* (non-governmental organizations), business, technology, singularity, and tools for apprehending and managing the diluvian flood of information that fast approaches the shores of our minds and bodies. (John promises that he will upload soon to the ASF website the PowerPoint slideshow.) John's knowledge about these topics, and others, seemingly knows no boundaries, as he answered many questions that at times became tangential to the topic at hand. John also is obviously passionate about the future; a passion I daresay became contagious among us, his listeners. The 'sense of wonder' for the future that John imbued for each participant would resonate for any fan of Science Fiction.

This meeting further served to remind me once again of the intelligence of each participant. But this time, due to the better opportunity to mingle, I was equally surprised to learn the occupations (and former occupations) of the group's members; no mundane careers here!

It is *probable* that *Gilda Cabral*, moderator of the **LV Futurists** <http://groups.yahoo.com/group/lvfuturists/> will permanently change the meeting venue. It also is *possible* that the schedule will change to the first Friday of each month. This latter change would allow for more cross-pollination between members of the **Futurists** and **SNAFFU**. Whether these changes occur, I suggest you attend at least one meeting to have a better lock on that light at the end of the tunnel, the future.

Chatback... the VFW Letter Column

This installment of Chatback starts with a letter that covers no fewer than five issues of VFW. Good thing we have the winner of the "Best Letterhack" FAAn Award for 2004 to write it...

As always, we are not masters of our time, especially our spare time, as others seem willing and able to rush in and fill it for us. Such is my lot these days. I just finished a daytime assignment with Tourism Toronto, and I now have a nighttime job with The Globe and Mail newspaper, entering appointment notices into their website. I have some money now, but time is in short supply. This will now change until I can get some more day time work, so while I work to make that happen, I can catch up on some zines. I am so far behind... Here are some comments on Vegas Fandom Weekly, issues 11, 12, 13 and 14.

11...After so many organizations being societies and clubs, I like the word League. Knowing what I do of fannish history, I like the idea of a Science Fiction League. The word resounds of action, while societies and clubs remind me of knitting circles and drudge-like assemblies.

I've won a couple of chili contests in my day... here are some ingredients that might come in handy. Cocoa adds darkness to the chili, and brings out the flavours in the spices. A little honey is good, as is soy sauce or Worcestershire sauce. Even coffee adds some flavour. I prefer fresh-brewed in the pot, although a couple of spoonfuls of instant stirred in will do in a pinch. It's almost easier to tell you what I don't put in it.

12...I'd thought in the past about trying one-day conventions open to the public to bring more people into the fold...not that To-

ronto is short of fans, but it would be nice to see about getting more people to attend conventions and the like. However, the topic almost invariably starts with Trek, and goes from there. When we mention books and fanzines, that blank look almost always appears. So, we chat up people at the existing conventions, and we find a good soul from time to time, and we invite them to the local fannish pubnights. That usually works.

I haven't been in apas for a while now, and I get invites from time to time to join FAPA, or APAPlexy in Ottawa. (Used to belong to the latter some years ago.) More and more people are noticing how much time blogs and lists take, and how little real communicating gets done. Toronto used to have an apa called, to no one's surprise, TAPA, and I had published in it 93 straight issues of my TAPAZine called *Yeggs 'n' Picaroons*. I enjoyed my days in TAPA very much, but I feel that fanzines provide me a large audience. Not much larger, but larger it is.

For Joshua Andrews...weep not for the Trek franchise, for it has been a victim of its own success. With four modern series and a string of financially successful movies, we have become jaded as Trek viewers, and we can pick and choose, and criticize openly. What we need is a hiatus of about four or five years. New ideas will come about, new directions will open, and fresh minds will take the Trek franchise in new directions. The idea of boldly going where no one has gone before is one of the most basic ideas in science fiction or any kind of adventure fiction. That's an idea that's been around for a long time, and it's not likely to fade away any time soon.

One advantage Vegas fandom has is that you and Joyce are willing to tell people about fannish history and why we do what we do, but you also have an audience willing to learn. That makes *The Enchanted Duplicator* come alive again; instead of becoming just another tale the older fans want us to hear. You're lucky; few fans I meet have any inter-



I signed up a hoax member, conducted conversations with him in the apa, and watched as he took on a life of his own. In no time at all I realized that he was more popular than I was in that apa and I quietly tried to get rid of him. That proved more difficult than I'd expected since many of the other apa members wanted to correspond with the hoax rather than with

me. Eventually I got rid of him and decided that I'd learned my lesson; no more hoaxes for me.

Five years later I'm at a convention and while wondering around in the dealer's room I bump into a guy who looked vaguely familiar. Glancing at his nametag I was stunned to see that it carried the exact same name as the hoax fan I'd thought I'd dispatched years before. I stared at him like a deer caught in the headlights while he looks at me with a puzzled expression. He says, "say! I think I know you, don't I?" I assure him that I've just moved here from the Ukraine and that he must be thinking of someone else and run for the door. Haven't seen him since then, but I won't be surprised to see him winning a "Best Fanwriter" Hugo or running against me for TAFF someday. Heck, *I'd* vote for him...

I greatly enjoyed the just concluded run of *BATTLESTAR GALACTICA* and like you noticed the odd little religious aspect. The first time that Baltar's imaginary Cylon friend mentioned her "one God," it occurred to me that the *Galactica* might eventually find Earth only to find it's the home of the "human" Cylons. Now *that* would be discouraging...

I used to work in a couple of movie thea-



ters back in the 80's and while I never heard of a distributor demanding 115% of the box office (highest our theater ever had to pay was 80%) I can see how that could happen. Most theaters make more on the concession sales than on many of the films anyway, and after the first week those percentages drop anyway. I recall that on a 3-week run of an average film we'd typically pay 70% the first week, 50% the second and 30% during the third. In a town with multiple theaters the distributors could make theaters bid against each other to see who'd pay the highest percentage of the gross. That really hit home on films like *The Empire Strikes Back* where we all *knew* that we'd have sold-out shows for weeks. The distributor makes out like a bandit on films like that.

I'd be curious to know more about Jennifer Weber's pulp cover print collection. Is this her own artwork based on pulp characters? "Pulp cover prints" sounds like enlarged prints of pulp covers - something I have a more than passing interest in. Either way, I'm interested. Can you tell us more?
