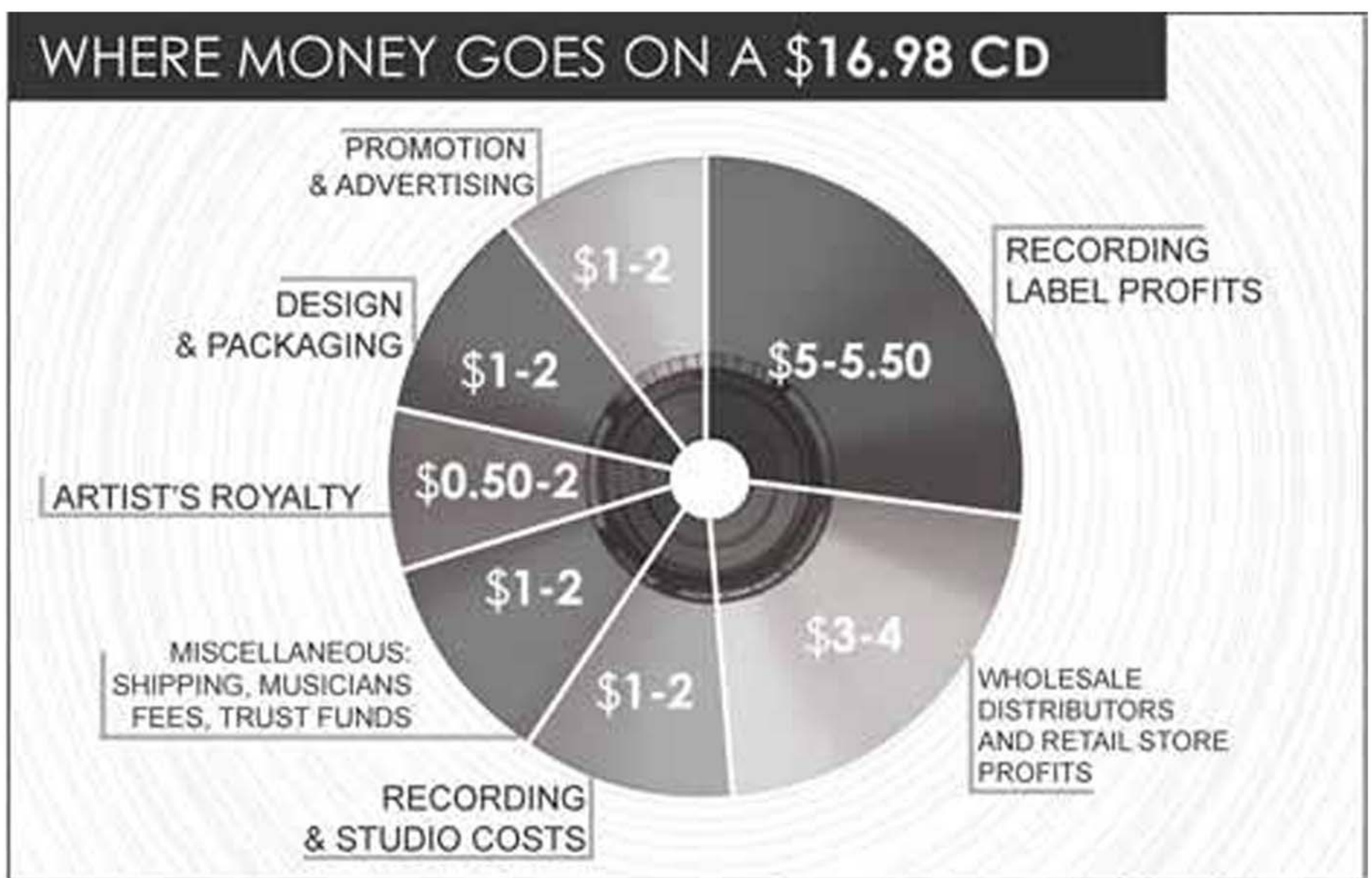


Fallacy
